- Workshops in Cleveland and Kent, Ohio that bring in community-engaged speakers to discuss some of the toughest issues our communities face and share tools/ skills to foster political efficacy
 - Speakers and participants learn from each other and gain new knowledge about the current state of several civic concerns and what each group can do to drive social change.
- Launched with funding from the American Political Science Association


WHAT MAKES GROWING DEMOCRACY UNIQUE?

- Our Process: An emphasis on education, dialogues, and action We focus on co-creation! Workshops, podcasts, and our online blog and curriculum are co-created WITH community stakeholders; we host experts who are skilled in educating, facilitating dialogue, and promoting action
- Our People: Bringing together practitioners, activists, university professors and students We collaborate with our stakeholders to ensure that all voices, especially those whose expertise and knowledge has been marginalized, are present; Our goal is to amplify the expertise of lived experience.
- Our Place: Filling a gap in the Northeast Ohio region Bridging gaps throughout northeast Ohio; bringing together people from urban and rural, cities and towns, across the NEO region; and focusing on grassroots effort to promote democracy.




